SWOT Analysis

Key Performance Indicators

Surveys and Feedback

Collect data from stakeholders to identify areas for improvement and measure satisfaction.

Data Quality

Visibility

Analytics

Developing a culture of <u>continuous improvement</u> requires a mindset shift. It's about empowering staff and volunteers to constantly look for ways to improve the organization.



Training

Train employees and volunteers on continuous improvement principles and methods.



Reward and Recognition

Recognize staff and volunteers for their contributions to continuous improvement efforts.



Cross-Functional Teams

Create cross-functional teams to encourage collaboration and diversity of thought.

Sustaining Improvement Efforts Over Time

Sustaining improvement efforts requires continuous attention and dedication. Nonprofits must build a structure and systems that support continuous improvement as a part of everyday operations.

1 Leadership

Leadership must explicitly prioritize and allocate resources to support continuous improvement.

2 Systems

Develop structured systems that support implementation of continuous improvement drives and sustain engagement overtime.

3 Culture

Create a culture of accountability where everyone is responsible for continuous improvement, and it is well embedded in everyday life of the organization.
